BREAST CANCER

Early Detection: Do You Know the Facts?

The Breast Cancer site is having trouble getting enough people to click on it daily to meet their quota of donation at least one free mammogram a day to an underprivileged woman. It takes less than a minute to go to their site and click on the pink box (pink window in the middle) which donates a mammogram for free to underprivileged women. This doesn't cost you a thing. The site's corporate sponsors/ advertisers use the number of daily visits to donate mammograms in exchange for advertising. Here is the address. Click on the www.thebreastcancersite.com Pass it along to people you know.

Here is some information provided by the breast cancer site. Each year, 182,000 women are diagnosed with breast cancer and 43,300 die. One woman in eight either has or will develop breast cancer in her lifetime. In addition, 1,600 men will be diagnosed with breast cancer and 400 will die this year.

If detected early, the five-year survival rate exceeds 95%. Mammograms are among the best early detection methods, yet 13 million U.S. women 40 years of age or older have never had a mammogram.

The National Cancer Institute and U.S. Department of Health and Human Services recommend that women in their forties and older have mammograms every one to two years. A complete early detection plan also includes regular clinical breast examinations by a trained medical professional. Monthly breast self-exams are suggested in addition.

On a personal note, please include Sue Briody in your thoughts and prayers. Sue had a mastectomy and reconstructive surgery in July. She is undergoing chemotherapy until December. MEA DeBunks DeVos

Every pro-public education voter who goes to the polls this fall will mean a greater level of success for Proposal 5 and MEA's recommended candidates- Governor Granholm and Senator Stabenow. Dick DeVos has spent millions of dollars on ads trying to convince Michigan's voters that he has a record of creating jobs. But the facts speak louder than his checkbook.

Last spring, DeVos sent a letter to all of Michigan's school superintendents that "applauded" the decision to outsource the jobs of 225 Grand Rapids bus drivers. He encouraged more school districts to privatize support staff and offered the help of his right-wing group, the Great Lakes Education Project, to assist districts in handing over more school jobs to for-profit companies.

DeVos also has a record of outsourcing jobs when he was in charge of Amway, where he laid off more than 1,400 Michigan workers in order to invest more than \$200 million in China.

The results of this fall's election will rely heavily on voter turnout. It is critical that all public education supporters exercise their right to vote on or before Nov. 7.

Good Eating

Baked Stuffed Pumpkin

Ingredients:

1 medium pumpkin
6 Granny Smith apples - peeled, cored and chopped
1 cup chopped walnuts
1 (16 ounce) can whole berry cranberry sauce
1 (20 ounce) can pineapple chunks, drained
3/4 cup packed brown sugar
1/2 cup golden raisins
1/2 cup dark rum (optional)
2 teaspoons minced fresh ginger root
1 tablespoon freshly grated nutmeg

Procedure:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

Position rack in the center of the oven.

Cut out top of pumpkin, and set aside. Scoop out seeds with a metal spoon. Rinse the inside of the pumpkin.

In a large bowl, stir together the apples, walnuts, cranberry sauce, pineapple, brown sugar, raisins, and rum. Season with ginger, nutmeg, and cinnamon, and mix well.

Spoon the mixture into the cleaned pumpkin, and replace top. Set pumpkin directly on a baking stone or a thick baking sheet. Cover the bottom of the pumpkin with foil in case of leakage. Bake for 1 hour in the preheated oven, or until pumpkin begins to soften. Remove from heat, and stir, scraping the sides gently, so that some pieces of pumpkin fall into the apple mixture.

This recipe is wonderful as a side dish and it is very impressive when you bring the whole pumpkin to the table! It may be served spooned over pound cake or pumpkin bread, and garnished with whipped cream.
