Kitchen Talk

Here is another recipe that Amy got from Heritage Park Inn.

Baked Coconut Cinnamon French Toast



Ingredients:

- 1/2 stick of softened butter
- 8 ounces of cream softened cheese
- 1/2 cup of maple syrup , divided in half
- 1 loaf of cinnamon raisin bread
- 8 eggs
- 2 1/2 cups of milk
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

- 1/4 cup of coconut
- 4 tablespoons of brown sugar
- Cinnamon
- Powdered sugar

Procedure:

Mix butter, cream cheese and half of the maple syrup. Heat in microwave until softened to a creamy texture. Mix well with a whisk. Place sliced raisin bread in a well-buttered (do not use spray) 13x9 glass baking dish. Spread the cream cheese mixture on top of the bread slices. Top with another slice of raisin bread.

Beat the eggs, milk, remaining maple syrup, and vanilla together. Pour this mixture over the bread and sprinkle with the coconut, brown sugar, and then the cinnamon. Cover

and refrigerate overnight. (The egg mixture will be absorbed through the cream cheese.)

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Uncover the baking dish and bring to room temperature. Bake for 50 minutes. Cut into 8 squares and serve with apple cider syrup. Sprinkle with powdered sugar.

Apple Cider Syrup

Ingredients:

- 1/2 cup of sugar
- 4 teaspoons cornstarch
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 cup of apple cider or apple juice
- 1 tablespoon of lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons of butter
- 1/2 cup of dried cranberries or raisins

Procedure:

In a small saucepan, stir together the sugar, cornstarch, cider, and lemon juice and cook over medium heat until the mixture is thickened and bubbly. Then cook for 2 minutes more. Remove from the heat and stir in the butter until it is melted. Then add the dried cranberries and simmer until you are ready to pour it over the French toast.

Amy's Audio Book Recommendations

Last year I discovered a new use for the CD player in my car. It suddenly dawned on me that I could go to my local library and check out a selection from their modest collection of audio books. So, after lining up the CDs like rockettes in my 6 disc-changer, I became a devoted recorded books reader. I know that I am hardly the first to do this, but I was so glad to find a new, free source of entertainment, that I felt I should share this tip. Best of all, I got to enjoy an additional 20 books last year.

When I was setting up my classrooms at the beginning of the school year, I would also use my classroom computer to listen to audio books. One word of caution though, don't try this with anything by Nora Roberts. A student or well-meaning custodian is sure to wander in during a steamy scene, and you will be diving towards the computer to mute it!

Two of my favorite books are An Ordinary Man by Paul Rusesabagina and The Thirteenth Tale by Diane Setterfield. The film Hotel Rwanda is based on the story told in An Ordinary Man. It is the true story of a humble hotel manager who single-handedly managed to save 1268 of his fellow countrymen by providing them refuge in his hotel during the 100 days of genocide that took place in Rwanda in 1994.

Paul Rusesabagina was that hotel manager. The story he tells is his own. He claims he is no hero. He is an ordinary man, who, under the worst of circumstances, followed his conscience to do what was right and kept his composure. Armed only with his powers of persuasion and a cellar of expensive liquor, Paul miraculously wards off the murderers who repeatedly come to his hotel, the Mille Collines in Kigali, intent on killing everyone in it. Paul's story is inspirational. It reminded me of the power of one. One person can make a difference. It reminded me I can make a difference too. Armed with a piece of chalk or a dry erase marker, I too can change lives.

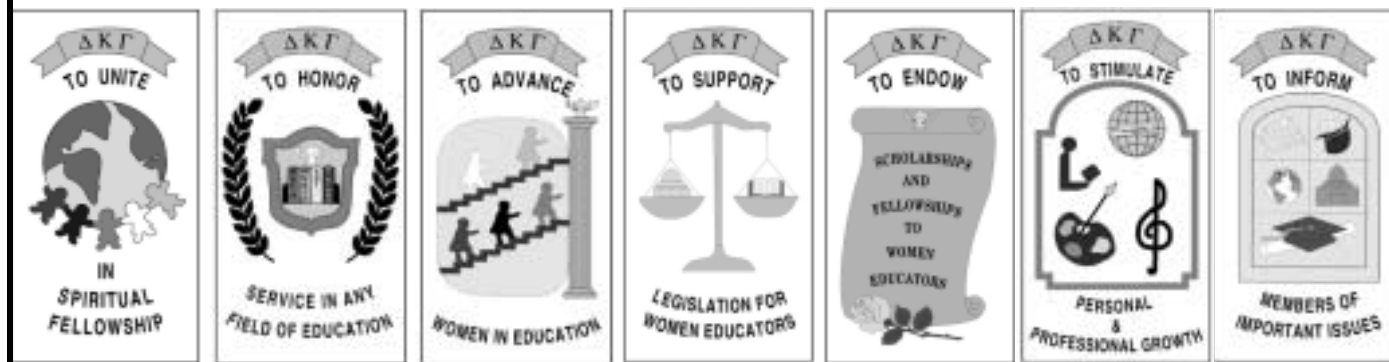
Paul's conclusion, like the rest of his book, is quietly amazing. It still gives me chills.

"I am a hotel manager trained to negotiate contracts and provide shelter for those who need it. My job never changed – even in a sea of fire. And so, when Evil dropped in for a drink, I was able to have a conversation. I could find its weaknesses and seek out its soft spots. I could see the vanity and insecurity and even the ghost of common decency inside the minds of killers that would allow me to save lives. Whenever the killing season should next begin, and people become strangers to their neighbors and themselves, my hope is still that there will be those ordinary men who say a quiet, "No." and open the rooms upstairs."

Diane Setterfield's novel The Thirteenth Tale is read beautifully by two women. Their voices give the story an extra quality and depth unequal to any other audio book I have "read." The young biographer Margaret Lea is mysteriously chosen to write the biography of the ailing, best-selling, and utterly reclusive author, Vida Winter. Miss Winter invites Margaret to stay at her estate so that she may record her story and the truth of the little girls of Angelfield. As Miss Winter recounts her last story, perhaps her famed, unpublished "thirteenth tale," Margaret discovers a secret of her own. A secret that makes her the perfect candidate to receive Miss Winter's story, her truth. The Thirteenth Tale unfolds slowly and unexpectedly. It details the fall an eccentric, aristocratic family. Their family secrets and crimes are laid bare and placed in the care of a stranger, Margaret Lea, for her to publish for the whole world to snatch up and greedily devour.

Read, or preferably, listen to the book and understand the words that haunted Vida Winter, "Tell me a story. Tell me the truth."
