

On March 26, 2009, the Detroit Free Press published an article stating that fewer than 10% of legally blind people in the United States read Braille and quoting a report that says Braille appears to be dying. The following letter to the editor of the Free Press is in response to that article:

To the Editor:

The teaching of Braille may be faltering, but I can assure you that Braille, itself, is not dying for those of us who have learned to make it a vital part of our lives. Children learning Braille are permitted the thrill of holding a book in their own hands, turning the next page eagerly to see how the plot will unfold and, almost without knowing it, learning spelling, punctuation, sentence structure, paragraph organization, and all that makes up clear writing. As an engineer with GM for over twenty years, I have gained access to mathematics thanks to Braille. Braille permits me to label paperwork so I can find information quickly. Braille has permitted me to read to my family, building special bonds of shared experience. In short, Braille is the key to literacy for those of us who are blind.

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MEA News Bites

Certification Alert

It is a teacher's professional responsibility to always know where their teaching certificate is and when it expires. Depending on the type of certificate that you've been issued by the Michigan Department of Education and when, you may have some work to do to maintain your certificate.

Remember that a Professional Education teaching certificate expires on July I of any given year and must be renewed prior to that date to avoid a district taking action against your employment. A district may only employ a teacher with a valid certificate and once your certificate expires and has not been renewed the district may terminate your employment. Without a valid teaching certificate you no longer can invoke your rights under the Tenure Act.

A teacher is responsible for maintaining the validity of a teaching certificate. The date of expiration appears on the face of a certificate so take time to know that date. It is not the responsibility of the district or the Michigan Department of Education (MDE) to notify the teacher of an impending expiration date.

Teachers with a Provisional teaching certificate with 3 years of successful teaching experience and who have earned at least 18 semester credits in a planned program are encouraged to advance to the Professional Education teaching certificate prior to July 1, 2009 in order to avoid taking an additional 3 semester credit course in reading. Applications to request a university or college to recommend you to the MDE must be received by the certification officer of the institution prior to July 1, 2009. Similarly, if you will be applying directly to the MDE (in the case of completing credits through an out-of-state institution) the application will need to be postmarked prior to July 1, 2009.

Teachers holding a Provisional Teaching certificate who cannot advance in certification prior to July 1, 2009 will need to take a 3 semester credit course in the diagnosis and remediation of reading difficulties as a condition of advancing to the Professional Education teaching certificate. All Michigan teacher preparation institutions are prepared to offer an approved course, however, you will need to work closely with an out-of-state institution to be assured of meeting this requirement prior to applying to advance in certification.

Kitchen Talk "Nutty Carrots"

Ingredients:

5 cups of carrots 1 1/2 cups of water 1/2 teaspoon salt

Sauce:

I/2 cup of melted butter
2 teaspoons of honey
I/4 teaspoon pepper
I teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons of lemon juice
I/4 teaspoon of grated lemon peel
Garnish:

1/2 cup of coarsely broken walnuts

Procedure:

Cook the carrots in the water with 1/2 teaspoon of salt until tender.

Drain thoroughly.

Meanwhile, heat the remaining ingredients, except the walnuts.

Pour the sauce over the carrots.

Toss with the walnuts.



Book Talk "My Gal Sunday"

Mary Higgins Clark



I won a basket of Mary Higgins Clark's books at a Christmas auction and this was the first one I read. Imagine Nick and Nora Charles with a taste for politics and none of the gin, and you'd be pretty close to Mary Higgins Clark's Henry Parker Britland IV and his attractive young wife, Sandra O'Brien Britland, known

as "Sunday."

Henry Britland, possessor of an enormous inherited fortune and known as one of America's sexiest men, has just finished his second term as president of the United States and is happily retired at 44, puttering around his New Jersey country estate.

Sunday, who bootstrapped her way up from a modest working-class background, is a junior congresswoman with a reputation for smarts. The two met, romantically enough, on the eve of Henry's leaving office, fell madly in love, and were married six weeks later.

In this collection of four pleasantly readable short stories, the sleuthing duo catch the murderer of a statesman's flashy amour, endure Sunday's kidnapping and mastermind her rescue, solve the 34-year-old mystery of the disappearance of a foreign prime minister from the Britland family yacht, and reunite a ransomed French boy with his parents at Christmas.

Of the four, "They All Ran After the President's Wife" may be the best plotted, and has a particularly amusing villain in the character of a caviar-loving terrorist. While the suspense is on the mild side throughout, the romance is lighthearted, but sincere, and the occasional flashes of wit are dryly appealing. With a cup of tea and a warm afghan, these stories are like sweet little bonbons to be enjoyed.

- Plans fellowship time as part of each meeting

- Has a wide variety of high-quality, interesting programs and speakers, including programs that highlight community initiatives and those that use members' talents/expertise
- Supports a variety of one-time and ongoing projects that actively engage members
- Supports projects in the areas of mentoring/Collaborative Connections; fund-raising and volunteer efforts; scholarships and grants-in aid; community initiatives, especially for women and children; literacy; the legislative process; and others, including international projects
- Communicates with members in multiple ways: newsletter (print, website or email 4+ times a year), phone, email, snail mail, website
- Publicizes the Society through projects and activities that receive newspaper coverage as well as school and community recognition
- Has specific strategies in place for attracting new members, retaining members, engaging retired and employed members, and developing/nurturing new chapter leaders

Research

One of the Seven Purposes of Delta Kappa Gamma is to **Inform** members of important issues. So...

Preschool teachers and parents/ Inform: grandparents take note: Adding more numbers to your vocabulary when speaking to preschoolers helps boost their math skills. Researchers at the University of Chicago found that when teachers of 3-5 year olds used more numbers in their everyday conversations and instruction, their students' math skills improved. Simple things like, "This group of 3 can line up now" is better than "This group here can line up now."

Inform: Why do you teach? Apparently, teachers who are motivated mainly by intrinsic factors, so called "autonomous motivation", have a greater sense of personal accomplishment and fewer feelings of exhaustion. Perhaps more importantly, they promote autonomy-supported teaching which offers students choice and greater clarification of subject relevance. This type of teaching then is reflected in students' more positive feelings for the task at hand and greater behavioral engagement. The researchers for this study concluded with concern that the increase in high stakes testing would have a detrimental effect on these highly effective teachers by making them feel "less autonomous and consequently act in more controlling ways toward their students."
