

Teen Dating Abuse (7:00 p.m. - 8:00 p.m.)

Teen Dating Abuse is a pattern of abusive behaviors that are used to gain power and control over a dating partner. Unhealthy relationship behaviors can start early and last a lifetime. Dating abuse occurs when harmful behaviors are repeated, creating a pattern of violence. According to recent research from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), one in eleven teens report being a victim of physical dating violence. Even more startling, adolescents who report experiencing dating violence are also more likely to report binge drinking, suicide attempts, physical fighting and current sexual activity. Mu Chapter has developed an effective program for educating students about this serious problem. 

NATIONAL COMMON CORE EDUCATION STANDARDS

The National Governors Association Center for Best Practices and the Council of Chief State School Officers have released the first official public draft of the K-12 standards as part of the Common Core State Standards Initiative, a process being led by governors and chief state school officers in 51 states, territories, and the District of Columbia. (Alaska and Texas are the lone holdouts having recently adopted and funded state standards.) These draft standards, developed together with teachers, school administrators and experts, seek to provide a clear and consistent framework to prepare our children for college and the workforce. At that site you can subscribe to receive news about how the process is proceeding.

NEW CREDIT CARD RULES

What has changed.

1. The credit card company cannot change the interest rate on existing balances. (There are some exceptions to this.)
2. The credit card company cannot change the interest rate on new accounts for 12 months.
3. The credit card company may not charge a fee if you go over your credit limit.
4. If balances on a credit card are subject to different interest rates, the company is required to apply any payment to the balance with the highest interest rate.
5. Your statement must be mailed or delivered at least 21 days before payment is due
6. Payment due dates must be the same every month, and if the due date falls on a weekend, the payment must be credited on the NEXT business day.
7. The credit card company can no longer use a customer's average daily balance over two months to calculate interest.
8. The credit card company is required to give at least 45 days notice before changing annual fees or cash advance fees.
9. Individuals under the age of 21 must have a cosigner in order to get a credit card. (Parents of college students rejoice!)

What has not changed.

1. There is no limit on the amount of interest which a credit card company can charge.
2. The interest rate on future purchases can change.
3. The credit card company CAN CHARGE AN INACTIVITY FEE as well as annual fees. The inactivity fee is probably going to be used by companies more often.

Meet Joanna Eiwien



Why do you teach?

Apparently, teachers who are motivated mainly by intrinsic factors, so called "autonomous motivation", have a greater sense of personal accomplishment and fewer feelings of exhaustion. Perhaps more importantly, they promote autonomy-supported teaching which offers students choice and greater clarification of subject relevance. This type of teaching then is reflected in students' more positive feelings for the task at hand and greater behavioral engagement. The researchers for this study concluded with concern that the increase in high stakes testing would have a detrimental effect on these highly effective teachers by making them feel "less autonomous and consequently act in more controlling ways toward their students."
