Speaker: Kids 4 Afghan Kids Update

Teaching students about diversity and the world around them can be a difficult task for educators. Northville teacher, Khris Nedam, and her sixth grade students took a unique approach in learning about Afghanistan. Her students discovered that the country had suffered a long drought, economic disruption due to the Soviet Union invasion, the Taliban rule, and the recent war. Students learned that children in many rural parts of Afghanistan had not had a school or access to a doctor in over 20 vears. After understanding the hardships of Afghan children, Mrs. Nedam's students decided to be tive and Kids 4 Afghan Kids was born. Under the guidance of their teacher, the students raised money and witnessed, via videotapes, internet and cell phones, the construction of a six-room school, a medical clinic, an orphanage, a bakery/kitchen, a guest house and community well for the residents of Wonkhai Valley, a mountainous area 3 hours southwest of Kabul. Come and be inspired by this unique and ongoing Social Studies Khris presented this session at the State Convention and for us last year. This is a review and update of the project. SBCEU

DRUGS WHICH CAN CAUSE MEMORY PROBLEMS

Recently published studies have found that a number of common prescription drugs can cause memory loss problems. Some of the prescription drugs known to have this effect are:

- Antiarrhythmics e.g. digoxin (Lanoxin) and disopyramide (Norpace)
- Antibiotics and antivirals e.g. Acyclovir (Zovirax), ciprofloxacin (Cipro), ganciclovir (Cytovene), metronidazole (Flagyl)
- Antihistamines chlorphiramine (ChlorTrimeton), dimenhydrinate (Dramamine), diphenhydramine (Benadryl)
- Antihypertensives clonidine (Catapres), and beta blockers such as atenolol (Tenormin) metaprolol (Lopressor) propranolol (Inderal)
- Corticosteroids methylpredinisolone (Medrol, Meprolone) prednisone (Deltasone, Orasone)
- Cough and congestion medications Dextromethorphan (Robitussin Cough Gels). Pseudoephedrine (Sudaphed)
- Gastrointestinal medications cimetiedine (Tagemeet), diphenoxylate (combined with atropine in Lofene, Lomotil), dicyclomine (Bentyl), glycopyrrolate (Robinul), hyoscomine (Anaspaz, Cystospaz), scopolamine (Scopace)
- Incontinence medications oxybutinin (Ditropan) solifenacin (VESIcare), tolterodine (Detrol)
- Migraine medications Naratriptan (Amerge), rizatriptan (Maxalt)
- Muscle relactants cyclobenzapine (Flexeril) orphenadrine (Antiflex)
- Painkillers codeine (generic), meperidine (Demerol), pentazocine (Talwin), propoxyphene (Darvon)
- Parkinson,s medications amantadine (Symmetrel), levodopa (Sinemet), selegiline (Eldepryl)
- Sleep medications eszapiclone (Lunesta), zaleplon (Sonata) zolpidem (Ambien CR)
- Tricyclic antidepressants amitriptyline (Elavil), imipromine (Tofranil), nortriptyline (Pamelor)

This information is given as a guide in determining alternatives each individual may want to consider. It also serves to inform you that memory problems may be caused by taking these drugs rather than advancing age. Younger individuals are not affected as dramatically as older individuals.



Cash for Grades?

In Houston, a three-month-old, privately funded \$1.5 million program will reward fifth-graders and notably their parents when they master basic math standards. Each family stands to earn \$1,050, not a small amount, especially in a community where 80 percent of kids qualify for free or reduced-price lunch. Meanwhile, down the road, more than 10,000 Dallas students have earned up to \$400 for taking and passing Advanced Placement tests in a newly expanded \$1.5 million program funded by a private foundation.

Most Americans, and many educators, still feel uncomfortable with the idea. According to the most recent national Phi Delta Kappa poll, one out of four Americans say students should be paid for their grades. There's something about the practice that just feels wrong. Many teachers also say paying students for grades leads to practical problems in their classrooms, including pressure to inflate grades and conflict with students and parents. But the bigger question is: Does it even work? Research shows that the money might better be spent on the kinds of things we know can help improve student achievement, like teacher training and smaller class sizes. The research on monetary rewards is quite clear. Any type of 'extrinsic' reward, by and large, undermines motivation. There has to be intrinsic motivation. What we really want is for people to value the activity of learning.
