What Are We Reading?

Hamnet

By Maggie O'Farrell



I am a real anglophile. In June, we stayed in Stratford - Upon - Avon. We visited every Shakespeare sight available. I really loved reading *Hamnet!* On one hand I was charmed by the beautiful writing style of Maggie O'Farrell, and on the other hand I enjoyed the educational side of the book about the Bard's life. However, reading historical fiction novels can be tricky for me! When a book gracefully combines facts and fiction, I sometimes end up not knowing where to draw the line between reality and fiction ... and that's something I felt often while reading *Hamnet*.

Hamnet tells an imagined story of Shakespeare's family life, focusing on what is usually mentioned only in footnotes: his mother, his father's occupation, his wife Anne, and his three children (Susanna, Judith, and Hamnet who died during childhood). It's a story of love, grief, passion, and hard work. What's interesting is that Shakespeare's name is not mentioned once in the story! However, it is very easy to recognize that the story is about him, especially once he moves to London and his plays are successful.

The book is divided into two parts and toggles between the past and the present. Part of part one takes place during the Black Plague. There are doctors wearing some kind of masks that look scary. People are frightened by the disease. Theaters are closed. A lockdown is imposed. Sounds a bit like Covid. On this is day, the plague first afflicts Hamnet's twin sister Judith. His mother and older sister are not at home to help. His grandmother is away. The grandfather is in his shop gives Hamnet a wallop for bothering him. His father is in London. So Hamnet runs into town for help. Then the story circles back to when Hamnet's parents' (Agnes and the unnamed father) passionate relationship began some 15 years earlier.

Part two begins immediately after Hamnet's death. Agnes struggles with grief while preparing Hamnet's body for burial. The father returns from London but departs again right after the funeral. *Hamnet* is, among other things, a love story about a sorely tested marriage. The father transposes his grief into his masterpiece - titled with a common variant of his son's name - in which the father dies and the son lives to avenge him. While reading the book it's impossible to not resonate with the story, to not empathize with the characters, to not relate with their fear of unknown. It was a lovely read.



A Message from Seedlings Director, Debbie Bonde

Dear Seedlings' Readers. Supporters, and Friends,

In July, we celebrated Seedlings' 40th Anniversary AND we have another big announcement!

It is with mixed emotions that I have decided to retire after 40 wonderful years of service. This was a difficult decision because I love what we do here at Seedlings, and I feel so fortunate having been a part of this amazing organization from the very beginning.

Seedlings got its start in my basement 40 years ago after I heard that braille books were scarce and expensive. My own young daughters had dozens of books so it didn't seem right that children with vision loss lacked the same opportunities to learn and grow through reading. Our goal was to make more braille



books available while keeping the prices low. With just 12 titles in our catalog and a small braille printer that my father made, we were able to send out 200 low-cost braille books that first year. And then the word began to spread!

Fast forward to the present: we now offer over 1,100 low-cost braille titles. In the past year, we distributed over 48,000 books, two-thirds of which were made available for free, and we reached a grand total of 3/4 of a million books placed in children's hands worldwide since 1984!

None of this would have been possible without all of the generous and dedicated people who have supported Seedlings' mission throughout the years. Thank you so much! As I transition into retirement, I am confident that Seedlings is in good hands for the next chapter: Seedlings 2.0!



I am thrilled to announce that our current Assistant Director, Amanda Hercula, will become our Executive Director by the end of the year. She has shown exceptional dedication and leadership during her four years here at Seedlings. She is a quick learner and has moved rapidly through several roles here. The more we worked together, the more I realized that she possessed the exact things we were looking for in our next Director: the experience and education, and most of all, the heart and passion for this work.

I assure you, this decision was not made lightly. Seedlings' Board of Directors developed a multi-year plan leading us up to this point for the smoothest possible transition. Stay tuned for

more information on Amanda in the coming months!

We hope you will continue to support Seedlings, especially during this time of change. I look forward to spending more time with my family and to my new role as a super Seedlings supporter! I know that Seedlings will do great things in the future and will be giving many more children the life-changing gift of literacy! Thank you again, from the bottom of our hearts, for all of your help and support!

Beverly House

Here is a little information about Beverly House.

Beverly House is run by Spectrum Child & Family Services. Their philosophy is simple: dignity and respect are human gifts belong to everyone.

Since 1976, they've worked to strengthen children, families, and communities across the state of Michigan.

Beverly House residents are teen girls whom the court has decided that it is in their best interest not to live in the family home. The Beverly House program is designed as a normal home-like setting with elements like:

- Going to school
- Learning to share common spaces with others
- Completing assigned household tasks which includes cooking for the house family, cleaning, making the bed
- Participating in school activities like going to the prom or extracurricular activities
- Volunteering and community involvement

Spectrum therapeutically address issues of traumas and behaviors associated with:

- Low self-esteem
- Substance abuse in the family
- Truancy
- Sexual abuse
- School related problems
- Neglect
- Separation from family.

The girls have very little in terms of possessions. Our donations and the activities we sponsor are truly appreciated by the residents and staff.



Member donations "rule of thumb":

- \$5-25 value is on the small items raffle cup table (yellow cups)
- \$25-50 value is on the large items raffle cup table (blue cups)
- \$50 or higher value is on the SILENT auction table. (Suggested bid is often 50-75% of the value.)

Raffle Cup Directions:

- Get a numbered cup: **yellow** for small items, **blue** for large items
- Write a description of your item on a card.
- Write the same number on the colored sticker and place it on your card.
- Put the same numbered sticker on your item as well. (Sometimes the cups get mixed up and if your card, item and cup are numbered, no mistakes.)

Silent Auction Directions:

- Write a description of item on a bidding sheet.
- Indicate a starting bid.
- Suggested bidding price is approximately half to 75% of the value

The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International, DKG, is a professional, international honorary organization of women who work in the educational field. The Society was established in 1929, naming the organization for the initial letters of the three Greek words meaning "key women educators." In each of the fifty states there are chapters, as well as in sixteen other countries and there are over sixty thousand members. Our local chapter is Gamma Alpha. We are teachers, counselors, and administrators. Our members are retired and currently employed. The chapter provides a strong professional and social networking opportunity and a chance to do community service. We support the international mission to "promote the professional and personal growth of women educators and excellence in education."

Gamma Alpha demonstrates we are Key Women Educators through our commitment to our DKG sisters and our service to others. One of our important chapter goals is our annual auction that raises money to support education in our communities (Seedlings Braille Books for Children and Beverly House for Young Girls,) DKG sponsored project (UNICEF Schools for Africa Project,) and classroom/project grants for early-career educators in the Wayne-Westland, Livonia, and Northville schools.

Gamma Alpha chapter assists and cooperates with the **Seedlings Braille Books for Children** organization in supporting, encouraging, and improving the education of visually impaired children. We volunteer binding Braille books and helping with mailings. Members volunteer at Seedlings' Bowling for Braille fundraising event and help to coordinate their Christmas card sales. The chapter 'adopts' a blind child and purchases books for him/her throughout the year.

Beverly House for Young Girls is service project Gamma Alpha members sponsor. Beverly House residents are teen girls whom the court has decided that it is in their best interest not to live in the family home. We have donated personal hygiene supplies, back to school supplies and clothes. We have made summer fun bags for the girls and purchased winter coats and hoodies. We have purchased a smart television and a streaming package for the house. Games and books have been purchased as well as storage and shelving for the books and games. Members help girls plants spring flowers at the house. We sponsor outings to the corn maize, Greenfield Village, Wayne Recreation Center, lunch, and mani-peds. We purchashed materials so the girls could make personal no sew blankets with our members. We sponsor a lane during Seedlings' annual Bowling for Braille so the girls have an opportunity for helping others while having fun.

In 1941, Ford Motor Co. received a \$200 million government contract to produce B-24 bomber planes. This was a thriving boost to Michigan's economy and the plant was known as the world's largest factory at the time. Ford simplified production to an assembly-line format. At the Michigan Flight Museum (formerly the Yankee Air Museum), you'll discover a diverse array of exhibits. While some are permanent fixtures, others grace the halls for a limited period. We will have a tour of the museum. We will visit the newest exhibit honoring the real Michigan women behind World War II icon Rosie the Riveter with a new exhibit "Women Answer the Call." The exhibit, which opened on Veterans Day 2023, depicts the working life of women at Willow Run, Women Answer the Call.
