Gamma Alpha Sisters,

Pam Emerson here! It's winter and I'm craving soup. How about you?

I can make my favorite soup from scratch, but sometimes I just want something easy—like canned soup. The question is: are canned soups healthy?

Borrowing tips from nutritionists quoted in *Real Simple* magazine, canned soup can be a good choice if you keep these guidelines in mind. What to look for in canned soup:

- Treat 1/2 can as one serving
- 300–600 mg sodium per serving
- 0 trans fat or hydrogenated fat
- 0 added sugars
- No more than 4 g saturated fat per serving

A good example of a canned soup is *Progresso Italian Style Bean & Pasta* (per 1/2 can serving). Nutritional information:

- 1 g saturated fat
- 2 g sugar



What Are We Reading?

The Housemaid

by Freida McFadden



Freida McFadden's psychological thriller *The Housemaid* is a fast-paced, twist-filled novel that grabbed me. The story follows Millie, a young woman with a troubled past who accepts a live-in housekeeping job for the wealthy Winchester family. What begins as an opportunity for a fresh start quickly turns unsettling as Millie realizes that nothing in this perfect suburban home is quite what it seems. (It was recently released as a movie.)

Why I think this nook is especially good for teachers:

- **A Perfect Mental Escape** Teachers spend their days making decisions, solving problems, and caring for others. *The Housemaid* offers pure escapism. It's a gripping story completely removed from lesson plans, grading, and classroom responsibilities. After a long day at school, this is the kind of book that lets your brain unwind while still staying fully engaged.
- **Relatable Themes of Perception vs. Reality** Teachers constantly navigate personalities—students, parents, administrators—and know firsthand that people are not always what they appear to be. The novel's exploration of hidden motives and unreliable appearances will resonate with educators who have learned to “read between the lines.”
- **Discussion Potential** For teachers who belong to book clubs, this novel is ideal. It raises questions about trust, judgment, ethics, and personal reinvention. The surprising twists make for lively conversations and spirited debates.
- **Model of Effective Storytelling** English and language arts teachers in particular will appreciate how McFadden structures the narrative. The book demonstrates strong pacing, point of view shifts, and the use of suspense—elements that can easily be pointed out to students as examples of engaging writing.
- **Manageable for Busy Schedules** Unlike dense literary novels, *The Housemaid* is quick and accessible. McFadden writes in short, punchy chapters with clear, accessible language, making the book an easy and addictive read. Teachers can read a few chapters at a time and still feel satisfied—perfect for those rare quiet moments during the school year.

In short, *The Housemaid* is not only an entertaining thriller but also a refreshing break from the serious, demanding world of education. It reminds teachers of the joy of reading purely for pleasure—something every educator deserves.

American Library Association Young Media Awards

On January 26, the American Library Association (ALA) announced the 2026 Media Youth Media Awards (YMA) honoring exceptional books and media for children and young adults. The winners were selected by librarians and educators. These awards, including the Newbery, Caldecott, Printz, Sibert, and others, highlight high-quality literature that supports literacy, critical thinking, and a love of reading.

For DKG members, these award-winning titles can provide trusted resources for your classroom use, chapter projects, community outreach, and meaningful conversations about diverse experiences and perspectives in education.

2026 Award Winners & Selected Books

Newbery Medal

Named after an 18th Century bookseller, this is awarded to the most distinguished contribution to American literature for children.

All the Blues in the Sky by Renée Watson This is a powerful novel about a teen navigating grief, friendship, and resilience after her best friend's death.

Caldecott Medal

This is awarded to the illustrator of the most distinguished American picture books for children.

Fireworks by Matthew Burgess, illustrated by Cátia Chien, is a vibrant picture book capturing the joy and rhythm of a summer day through lyrical prose and expressive art.

Printz Award

This is named for a Topeka, Kansas librarian and is awarded to a book that exemplifies literary excellence in young adult literature.

Legendary Frybread Drive-In: Intertribal Stories edited by Cynthia Leitich Smith is an anthology of teen stories exploring contemporary Indigenous life with humor, heart, and cultural depth.

Odyssey Awards (Audiobooks)

This is awarded to the producer of the best audio books for children or young adults.

Clack! Clack! Smack! A Cherokee Stickball Story by Traci Sorell, illus. by Joseph Erb (children's winner) is a lively audiobook recounting a Cherokee stickball game with energetic narration and music.

Trans History: From Ancient Times to the Present Day by Alex L. Combs & Andrew Eakett (YA winner) is a comprehensive and engaging audio exploration of trans history across eras and cultures.

Sibert Medal

Alberto Salas Plays Paka Paka Con La Papa by Sara Andrea Fajardo, illus. by Juana Martinez-Neal is a nonfiction picture book about a scientist racing to save Peruvian potato varieties from climate threats.

Morris (Debut YA Author)

All the Noise at Once by DeAndra Davis is a debut YA novel following an autistic teen chasing his athletic dreams while confronting systemic injustice.

Other Notable Awarded and Honored Titles

Batchelder Award

This award is for books originally published in a foreign language and subsequently translated into English and published in the United States.

Croco by Azul López, trans. by Kit Maude is a playful story about a crocodile's inventive efforts to escape a hole, full of spirited illustrations.

Pura Belpré Awards

The award is named after Pura Belpré, the first Latina librarian at the New York Public Library.

The Pecan Sheller by Lupe Ruiz-Flores is a children's book honoring Latino cultural heritage through family and tradition.

Popo the Xolo illustrated by Abraham Matias is a magical picture book about a grandma's dream journey with her dog in an indigenous afterworld.

Coretta Scott King Awards


The Coretta Scott King Book Awards are given to outstanding African American authors and illustrators that demonstrate an appreciation of African American culture and universal human values.

Under the Neon Lights by Arriel Vinson is a promising new voice in youth literature with a compelling story of identity and discovery.

These awards reflect a rich tapestry of voices and perspectives in children's and young adult literature, offering titles that entertain, educate, and inspire readers of all ages.

- 0 g trans fat
- 670 mg sodium
- 8 g protein
- Contains calcium, iron, and potassium
- 19 g protein per full can (as labeled)

Here are some other nutritionist recommended varieties:

- Lentil
- Minestrone
- Chicken & Vegetable
- Split Pea
- Vegetable & Barley

Heart-healthy reminders:

- AHA sodium guideline: 1,500–2,300 mg per day
- Aim for 0 trans fats (they raise LDL “bad” cholesterol and heart disease risk)
- Limit saturated fat to about 13 g per day

If you want to stay fuller longer, choose soups with 5–7 grams protein per serving and at least 3 or more grams fiber per serving. Fiber comes from whole grains, vegetables, legumes, nuts, and seeds. (Walnuts and almonds are top picks.) Nuts also make a great evening snack.

Vitamins matter because they support your gut, immune system, heart, brain, skin, hair, and nails. Post this on your fridge for a quick, helpful reminder. And yes - slurping is allowed!

Five Things You're Going to See in Public Education in 2026



An NEA *Today* article by Mary Ellen Flannery predicts five major trends in public education for 2026. Here is a summary:

1. **Better Pay for Educators** Teacher salaries are continuing to rise, with the largest increases in over 15 years. These gains are credited to strong union advocacy and collective bargaining. Educators are expected to keep pushing for fair wages that allow them to live and work in their communities.
2. **More Voucher Bills** Efforts to divert public school funding to private schools through voucher programs are likely to increase. Although voters have repeatedly rejected vouchers, lawmakers and special interest groups continue to promote them. Educators will need to stay organized and vocal to protect public education funding.
3. **More Cellphone Bans in Schools** Cellphone restrictions are becoming more common. Research suggests these policies improve learning and student well-being..
4. **Election of More Pro-Public Education Candidates** Recent elections showed strong voter support for candidates who prioritize public schools and working families. This trend is expected to continue in 2026.
5. **Growth in NEA Membership** As more teachers and faculty seek a stronger voice in workplace decisions, NEA membership is projected to continue expanding.

Overall Message:

Public education in 2026 will be shaped by stronger unions, improved educator pay, ongoing battles over vouchers, growing cellphone restrictions, and increasing political support for public schools
